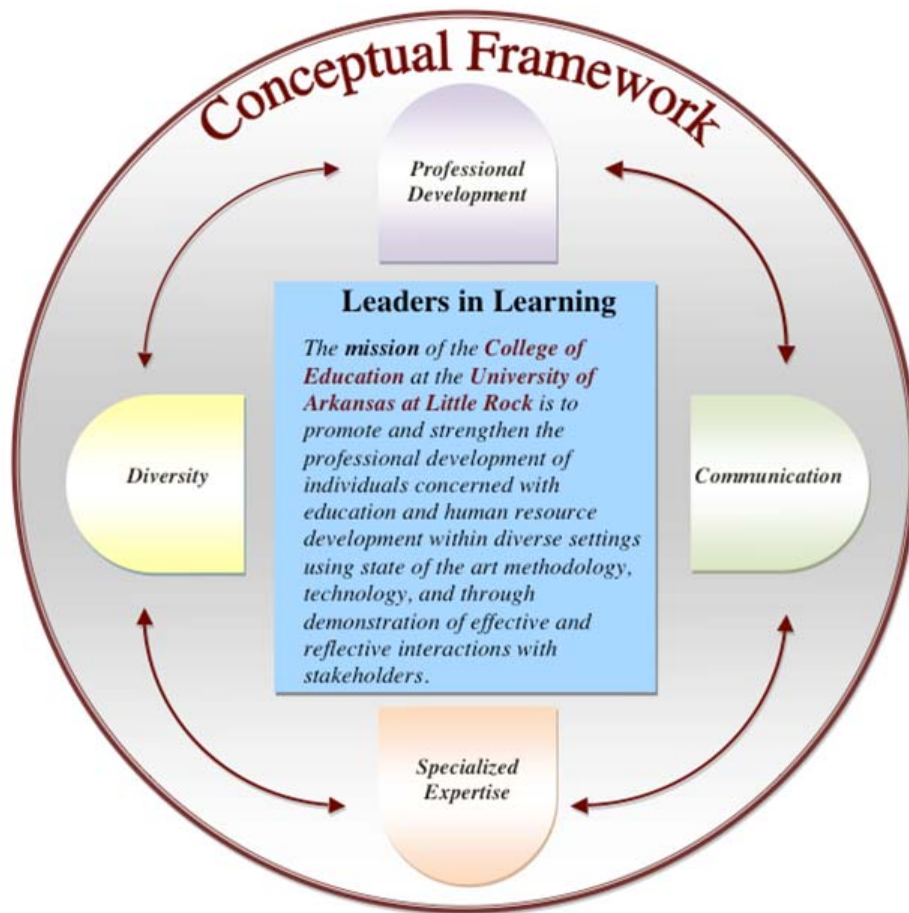

Guide for Students in UALR Undergraduate Secondary Education Programs

(For Students entering UALR under the 2009-10 and later Undergraduate Catalog)

We are pleased that you are interested in a Secondary Education Program. Teaching is extraordinarily rewarding, and we want to help you to succeed in your chosen vocation.

You should read the section about Secondary Education Programs in the Undergraduate Catalog, since it is the official statement of policy related to the programs, but this guide provides additional and essential information to help you through the processes and requirements related to your program.

Read the entire Guide upon entering a program and then retain it for frequent consultation regarding details as you go through the many steps of the program.

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Overview of the Programs

Since it is often necessary to distinguish between you, a student at UALR, and the high school students you are being prepared to teach, this guide will hereafter refer to UALR students in Secondary Education Programs as “teacher candidates.” You will hear the term often throughout your Program.

Universities do not license teachers; the State of Arkansas does. However, following the guidelines of the Arkansas Department of Education (ADE), UALR offers courses and experiences that prepare you to be licensed by the State and, upon successful completion of UALR’s requirements, signs a form that must be included in your application to the State for licensure.

UALR’s programs are accredited by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE), which sets rigorous standards and requires a systematic assessment of programs and teacher candidate achievement. NCATE also requires that programs be recognized by more narrowly defined disciplinary Specialty Professional Associations (SPAs), when such associations exist. SPAs set their own discipline-based standards and assessment requirements.

The names of state licensure areas are not always identical with the names of the UALR majors that will prepare you to teach in those areas. For example, teacher candidates major in either History or Political Science to prepare for the state licensure area of Social Studies, and they major in Health Sciences to prepare for the state licensure area of Physical Education, Wellness, and Leisure Science.

The licenses for which UALR prepares teacher candidates may include grade-levels prior to high school. See *Table 1 (Licensure Areas: Content Major Advisors and BOSS Program Names and Codes Secondary Education Programs)* for information about the grade levels covered in your licensure area.

Each Secondary Education Program includes at least four and as many as six components:

- University core courses
- Second language requirement (in programs in which a BA is awarded; BS degrees are exempt)
- Content Major
- Secondary Education Minor (SCED)
- An additional (in some programs) minor or special block of courses. For example, History and Political Science majors preparing for licensure in Social Studies must do a Social Studies minor, and Foreign Language majors must take a special block of four English as a Second Language courses.
- A series of nationally standardized exams, the *Praxis Series*

Steps for Successful Progress through a Secondary Education Program

Step 1: Meet with your Content Major Advisor

Your content major advisor is your advisor in the discipline in which you are majoring (for example, Biology, English, or Health Sciences). Make an appointment to meet with this advisor and keep it. See *Table 1: Licensure Areas; Content Major Advisors and BOSS Program Name and Codes* at the end of this Guide for contact information for the advisor in your area.

This advisor will help ensure that you declare the proper major and minor(s) in BOSS and advise you when to begin registering for courses in the Secondary Education Minor.

You will also meet with this advisor prior to course registration each semester. Teacher candidates in secondary education programs often need to take specific courses within the menu of university core courses, so you should work carefully with your advisor to avoid having to take additional hours.

Step 2: Declare a Major and Minor(s) in BOSS

Declare in BOSS the proper content major. The major you declare is one with a special track for secondary education. For example, the BOSS program name for the regular English major is “English-BA,” whereas the name for major with the special track is “English/Secondary Ed-BA.” See *Table 1: Licensure Areas; Content Major Advisors and BOSS Program Name and Codes* at the end of this guide for the program name and code of your area. (In most BOSS pages, the program name will be displayed, but you may sometimes see the code.)

Also you must declare the Secondary Education Minor (SCED) as your first minor, and any additional minors required in your program. Again, see *Table 1: Licensure Areas; Content Major Advisors and BOSS Program Name and Codes* at the end of this guide.

Entering these declarations in BOSS is essential to enable your advisor to help track your progress through the program. Additionally, the correct major and minor(s) declarations ensure proper graduation checkout.

Declaring the Secondary Education Minor (SCED) will *not* automatically qualify you to take courses within the Minor. Each of the three blocks of courses within the Minor has admission requirements that must be met before you can register for courses within the block. (See below for details pertaining to each block.) *However, if you are pursuing a secondary education program, declare the Secondary Education Minor, as the first minor, at the same time you declare your content major, even if you have not yet met the admission requirements to Block I of the Minor.*

Step 3: Learn about the Praxis Series Exams

To progress through the Secondary Education Minor, you must pass a series of nationally standardized exams, the *Praxis Series*, produced by Educational Testing Services (ETS).

You must pass the *Praxis I: Pre-Professional Skills Tests* (PPST) to be admitted to Block I courses, and pass all required Praxis II exams to be admitted to Block III courses.

These exams are required by the State of Arkansas and many other states. If you are going to be licensed to teach in Arkansas, you must pass these exams regardless of where you get your education.

Some general information about these exams will be covered here. More specific information about particular exams is addressed below in the context of the various blocks of courses of the Secondary Education Minor.

The ETS website for the *Praxis Series* is www.ets.org/praxis. The site includes a wealth of information about the exams. You will usually register and pay for the exams at this site.

Although ETS provides special arrangements for students with disabilities, not all test dates provide for them.

When registering for any exam in the *Praxis Series*, be sure to use the university code R6368, so the results will be sent to UALR.

Since passing a given exam or exams is required to move from one block of courses in the Secondary Education Minor to the next, and because the exams are offered only on certain dates, it is crucial to pay close attention to the status of your progress in the minor and when the exams are offered. Since UALR will not receive the scores on Praxis I exams until three weeks after you take it and four to seven weeks after you take the Praxis II exams, careful planning is required in order to avoid delaying your progress. Timely registration for the exams is also required to avoid late registration fees.

If you have to retake an exam, you will not know with certainty in time to register for the next exam date (without paying late fees), since you will not receive your results from the first test until *after* the next registration deadline passes. Thus, if you suspect you have not done well on an exam or have failed it, and you think you will be better prepared by the date of the next exam (talk to your advisor about this), you should register for the next offering of the exam *before* your first scores arrive, in order to avoid a late registration fee. If it turns out that you have passed the first exam, ETS will refund the money for your second exam registration.

The Praxis exams are a legitimate use of financial aid, and you may use money from your financial aid change check to pay for them.

ETS also offers fee waivers, on a limited basis, for exams in the *Praxis Series*. Teacher candidates who qualify for financial aid may apply for one fee waiver each year using the forms on the ETS web site. To find the fee waiver forms and information, go to www.ets.org/praxis, click on “register for a test,” then choose the tab labeled “fees.” Scroll all the way to the bottom of the page and click “fee waivers.” Fee waivers are handed out on a first-come, first-served basis beginning in August, so if you plan to apply for one, it is best to do so in the fall.

Table 2: Licensure Area and Praxis Exams at the back of this document indicates, by licensure area, the test numbers, names, costs, and Arkansas minimum scores of the Praxis exams.

Step 4: Fulfill Admission Requirements for Block I Courses

In order to register for Block I Courses, you must meet the following requirements:

- Completion of 60 hours
- 2.65 cumulative GPA
- Grades of C or better in the following courses:
 - MATH 1302 or 1315
 - RHET 1311 and 1312
 - SPCH 1300

- Pass Praxis I: *Pre-Professional Skills Tests* (PPST)

Meet regularly with your content advisor for guidance in meeting these requirements and advice about when to take the Praxis I: *Pre-Professional Skills Tests* (PPST). The exam consists of three tests—Reading, Writing, and Mathematics—but most teacher candidates take all three tests in the same sitting. (See *Table 2: Licensure Areas and Praxis Exams* at the end of this guide for the ETS test numbers and names, costs, and minimum passing scores set by the State of Arkansas.) If you happen to fail one or two of the tests, you may retake those failed tests until you pass them. You do not have to retake any test that you have already passed.

“Paper and pencil” tests can be taken at various sites throughout the state on the dates found on the ETS website (www.ets.org/praxis). The site includes many different dates for many different exams in the Praxis Series, so read the list carefully. Be sure you have identified a location and date for the Pre-Professional Skills Tests (PPST).

The Praxis I tests may also be taken electronically at Prometric Testing Center, 1404 North Pierce Street, Little Rock. Call 1.800.853.6773 or 501.663.8280 to schedule the tests. Prometric will inform you how to pay for the tests if you use its services.

No matter how you take the tests, you must pass all three of them before registering for Block I courses. Remember that since results are not reported to UALR until three weeks after you take the tests, you should plan to take them early enough for UALR to receive the scores in time for you to register for Block I courses.

Step 5: Register for Block I Courses

Schedule an advising appointment with your content major advisor during the semester prior to the semester in which you wish to register for Block I courses. Your advisor will review your records to ensure you have met admissions requirements for Block I. If you have done so, your advisor will sign a form verifying this fact—the *Secondary Education Programs Student Advisement Record* form—and forward it to Rene Carson in the College of Education (501.683.7306; rtcanson@ualr.edu; DKSJN 323). If time is short, you may be asked to deliver the form by hand.

If Praxis I scores have not been received or final grades for the required MATH, RHET, or SPCH courses (see above) have not been posted at the time the *Secondary Education Programs Student Advisement Record* form is completed, the College of Education will hold the form until the Praxis I scores have been received or grades are posted. (If a Praxis I score does not meet the minimum required, or if a grade in one of the required MATH, RHET, or SPCH is below a C, Rene Carson will advise your content major advisor by email.)

When you are cleared for registration in Block I courses, Karen Irons of the College of Education (569.3023 or 569.3124; kdirons@ualr.edu; DKSJN 300 E) will send you an email advising you of this fact. She may also provide you with the Course Reference Number (CRN) of the particular section of a course for which you are to register.

Register for the following courses:

- SCED 3210 Instructional Skills and Assessment
- SCED 3110 Practicum

(The Practicum consists of three hours per week in a high school setting where a university supervisor observes you in classroom teaching situations and evaluates your performance.)

Register for classes as soon you are cleared, so there is plenty of time to resolve problems that might arise.

Step 6: Purchase a *Chalk and Wire* Account

All secondary education programs use an electronic software system, *Chalk & Wire*, that allows teacher candidates to easily build and maintain an electronic portfolio of course, practicum, and internship performances. The software also allows faculty to do data analyses. Both features serve as a major tool for the teacher candidate and program assessment process.

All teacher candidates must purchase a *Chalk & Wire* account at the UALR bookstore in the DSC. As of Fall 2010, an account costs about \$97 for a four-year contract. (When

you apply for a job, you will find the portfolio extremely valuable, and the four-year contract means you will have access to the portfolio for some time after you graduate.)

Take your account receipt and information to the East Lab (Dickinson 109), where you will register the account, create the initial electronic portfolio shell, and answer various background information questions. Thereafter, you will be uploading various assignments and typically will not receive a grade in a course unless the assignments are uploaded and assessed by a faculty member by the end of the semester. This process will be carefully explained in the Block I courses.

Step 7: Complete a Federal Background Check

Since you will be in school classrooms for SCED 3110 (the practicum in Block I), another practicum in Block II, and the student internship in Block III, you are required to complete a federal background check and undergo fingerprinting conducted by the Arkansas State Police and the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

You should begin the process during the first two weeks of Block I by obtaining fingerprint cards and an application form from Rene Carson in the College of Education (501.683.7306; rtcanson@ualr.edu; DKSJN 323). Ms. Carson will also provide you with important information that you need to complete the process. Then take the fingerprint cards and application form to the State Police Headquarters. The Headquarters is open M-F, 7:30 am to 4:30 pm (for more information go to <http://www.asp.state.ar.us/asp/directory.html>).

Note that this initial background check and fingerprinting covers only your practicums and internship in the Secondary Education Program. You will be required to go through the process again toward the end of your program as part of the application process for your teaching license. Your teaching license will not be processed by the Arkansas Department of Education (ADE) unless you provide a new background check and fingerprints.

Step 8: Fulfill Admission Requirements for Block II Courses

In order to register for Block II Courses, you must meet the following requirements:

- Complete Block I courses with C or better
- 2.65 cumulative GPA
- Demonstrate appropriate dispositions in the interview upon exiting Block I.

Step 9: Register for Block II Courses

Schedule an advising appointment with your content major advisor during the semester prior to the semester in which you wish to register for Block II courses. Your advisor will review your records to ensure you have met admissions requirements for Block II. If you

have done so, your advisor will sign a form verifying this fact—the *Secondary Education Programs Student Advisement Record* form— and forward it to Rene Carson in the College of Education (501.683.7306; rtcanson@ualr.edu; DKS 323). If time is short, you may be asked to deliver the form by hand.

If final grades for Block I courses are not posted at the time the *Secondary Education Programs Student Advisement Record* form is completed, the College of Education will hold the form until grades are posted. (If a grade for a Block I course is below a C, or if your overall cumulative GPA falls below 2.65, Rene Carson will advise your content major by email.)

When you are cleared for registration in Block II courses, Karen Irons of the College of Education 569.3023 or 569.3124; kdirons@ualr.edu) will send you an email advising you of this fact. She may also provide you with the Course Reference Number (CRN) of the particular section of a course for which you are to register.

Register for the following courses:

- SCED 4321 Teaching Diverse Adolescents
- SCED 4124 Adolescent Diversity Practicum
- SCED 4123 Adolescents with Special Needs
- SCED 4122 Classroom Management

(The Practicum consists of three hours per week in a high school setting where a university supervisor observes you in classroom teaching situations and evaluates your performance.)

Register for classes as soon you are cleared, so there is plenty of time to resolve problems that might arise.

Step 10: Fulfill Admission Requirements for Block III Courses

In order to register for Block III Courses, you must meet the following requirements:

- Complete Block II courses with C or better
- 2.65 cumulative GPA
- Pass all required Praxis II exams in the *Praxis Series*

The Praxis II exams you must take vary depending on your content or licensure area. All areas require more than one content exam. Some teacher candidates take all of them on the same day, but some programs advise against doing so. Begin early to plan a timeline with your content major advisor for taking these exams, since the advisor will know when you should be prepared sufficiently by course-work to pass the exams.

See *Table 2: Licensure Areas and Praxis Exams* at the end of this guide for the content exams required in your licensure area, the ETS test numbers and names, costs, and minimum passing scores set by the State of Arkansas.

Testing dates are published at www.ets.org/praxis. Although the tests are offered at various times throughout each semester, remember once again that it can take up to seven weeks for scores to be reported to UALR. Accordingly, if you are to enter Block III (which includes the student teaching internship) in the subsequent semester, you should take the Praxis II content exams as early as possible in the semester of Block II. Failure to pass the exams or to pass them early enough for UALR to have received the scores will bar you from receiving a student teaching internship assignment.

Step 11: Register for Block III Courses

Schedule an advising appointment with your content major advisor during the semester prior to the semester in which you wish to register for Block III courses. Your advisor will review your records to ensure you have met admissions requirements for Block III. If you have done so, your advisor will sign a form verifying this fact—the *Secondary Education Programs Student Advisement Records* form—and forward it to Rene Carson in the College of Education (501.683.7306; rtcanson@ualr.edu; DKSJN 323). If time is short, you may be asked to deliver the form by hand.

If Praxis II scores have not been received or if final grades for Block II courses are not available at the time the *Secondary Education Programs Student Advisement Record* form is completed, the College of Education will hold the form until the Praxis II scores have been received or grades are posted. (If a Praxis II score does not meet the minimum required, a grade in a Block II course is below a C, or your overall cumulative GPA is below 2.65, Rene Carson will advise your content major advisor by email.)

When you are cleared for registration in Block III courses, Karen Irons of the College of Education (569.3023 or 569.3124; kdirons@ualr.edu ; DKSJN 300 E) will send you an email advising you of this fact. She may also provide you with the Course Reference Number (CRN) of the particular section of a course for which you are to register.

Register for the following courses:

- TCED 4600 Internship
- SCED 4330 Reflective Teaching

(The Internship consists of 12 weeks of student teaching in a high school setting where a university supervisor observes you in classroom teaching situations and evaluates your performance.) Register for classes as soon you are cleared, so there is plenty of time to resolve problems that might arise.

Step 12: Take the Praxis II Pedagogy Exam

All licensure areas require a pedagogy test that addresses teaching methods and practices, and must be passed prior to the completion of Block III. Some areas require their own content-pedagogy exam. (The Life/Earth Science area, for example, requires the *Life Science: Pedagogy* exam. Teacher candidates in areas that do not require a content-

specific pedagogy exam are required to take *Principles of Learning and Teaching (PLT) 7-12th Grades.*) Although the Music and Art licensure areas cover grades P-12, teacher candidates in these areas need take only one level of the *Principles of Learning and Teaching* exam and not all three grade-range levels of the exam. See *Table 2: Licensure Area and Praxis Exams* at the back of this document for the pedagogy exam required in your area.

Step 13: Apply for Graduation

Talk to your content major advisor and watch for the announcement in the BOSS Registration Guide for the deadline for submitting your application to graduate. If for some reason you do not graduate in the semester for which you applied, you must reapply in a subsequent semester; *your application does not roll to the next semester.*
